

FROM THE GENERAL MANAGER

Recently I received the following letter from a V.A.F.A. umpire and after reading it felt it warranted circulation throughout Amateur ranks, especially when you consider the lack of umpires existing at present.

"Dear Peter,

I have been umpiring with the Amateurs for a number of years and this year, more so than in previous years, have become disillusioned with the never-ending questioning/commentary/re-action by players to decisions I may have made/or they believe I should have made.

In recent weeks I have seriously questioned whether my normal umpiring performance has slipped to the extent that it is directly responsible for reactions previously referred to.

Accordingly, I have two alternatives; the first will be to attempt to improve by my own performance is the best I can do. If the disillusionment continues to the extent that it has happened this year, then the remaining alternative will be to withdraw my services as an umpire with the V.A.F.A. for I am not prepared to be subjected to the continual on-field commentary of players.

I have spoken to two other more experienced senior umpires who have recently officiated in games in the D to F grade section, and now re-call comments made by senior A and B grade umpires who have officiated in D to F section finals games in previous years. The latter have mentioned the disputation of

umpires decisions, and their concern for home and away game umpires during the year whilst the former have noticed a significant increase in verbosity in recent games.

The purpose of this letter is not for my own regard, but for the regard of less experienced umpires in all grades as well as maintaining the standard of amateur football.

The V.A.F.A. needs to retain all the umpires they have as well as entice others to become umpires. In talking with players after the game, a most frequent comment is 'I wouldn't be an umpire with all the abuse they have to take'.

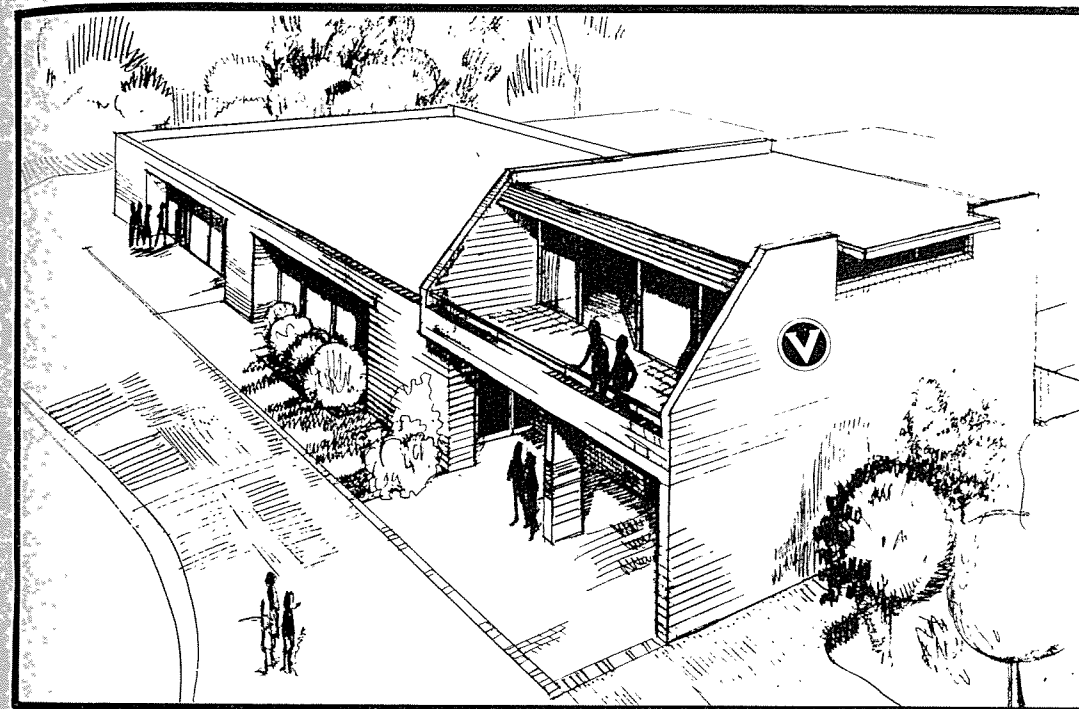
Continual disputation of umpires decisions must have some effect on his concentration and accordingly his performance. It also has a direct effect on the performance of players. For example, in one match this year the coach of one of the teams mentioned to me just prior to the commencement of the third quarter that he had instructed his players that he would remove them from the field if they continued to dispute my decisions. I believe that his team's attitude in the second half was directly attributable to them winning by 14 goals, by kicking 12 goals to 2 goals in the second half.

Maybe I have been remiss in not taking more positive action myself (reporting the players for misconduct), but the problem is more widespread than individualistic. Although I do appreciate the onerous task undertaken by your Executive in resolving off-field difficulties with Clubs in the current year, I do request that Clubs again be reminded of their on-field responsibilities as well.

A Section produced mild surprises with Collegians and De La Salle going down to North O.B. and Marcellin respectively, paving the way for the Blues to move to top of the ladder.

North's win keeps them in with a chance of defending their A section title whilst Scotch is gradually getting a stable and capable side together, a team which will have much say in shaping the final four.

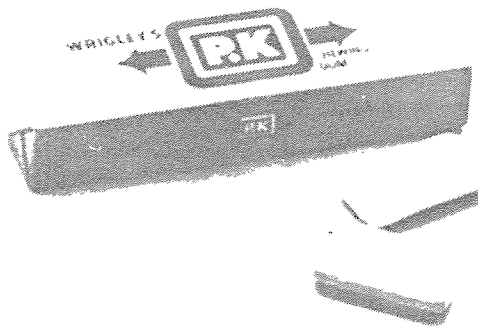

Old Carey (C) won their first game when they defeated third place Old Brighton — 5 goals down at half time, they kicked 12.7 to 6.4 in the second half with best, Michael Cooke, Wiseman, Bryan (Old Carey) and Shepherd, Gedye, Parioisson (Old Brighton).

Old Geelong moved back into "E" section four with a strong final term against North Brunswick, Hunter (9 gls.) Ross-Edwards, Sheahan (Old Geel) and Hughes, Fox, J. Payne (N. Bruns.) were best.

TEN YEARS AGO — 1973

Caulfield Grammarians staged a reversal of form to beat Coburg by 51 points in the main game as the week before they failed miserably to St. Bernard's and lost their place in the four. Best were Griffiths, McNicol, Morphett (Caulfield Gram.) and Warle, Clark, Hihbard (Coburg).

'D' section coaches were Darrell Cranch (Old Haileybury), Tony Bull (State Savings Bank), Frank Clarke (Toor-Malv.), George Rice (Parkside), Bryan Harding (Assumption), John Boyle (Brunswick), Ken Kenny (Fairfield), Bert Gaudion (National Bank), and Ross Oakley (St. Kevin's O.B.). Who coached A.J.A.X.?

TWENTY-FIVE YEARS AGO — 1958

A record crowd for a home and home match at Olympic Park saw a thrilling finish between 'A' section leaders, Collegians and Old Xaverians with Collegians finishing four points in front and holding on to top place, Collegians 25 points down at half-time, kicked 6.3. to 1.2, in a blistering third quarter. Old Geelong Grammarians hung on to their place in 'B' section four when M.H.S.O.B. failed by a point to overhaul O.G.G.'s last change lead of 33 points. Best were Laird, J. Stephen and Captain-coach David Lee (O.G.G.) and Jocka Nelson, Geoff Paul and Scott (M.H.S.O.B.).

In the battle of top 'C' section teams De La outlasted Parkside to win by 23 points with B. Teague, Nesbitt, Watts (De La) and Billington, Kiff, and Dempster (Parkside) best.

Johnny Neeson, Ivanhoe 'B and F' in 1957, played his 100th game.

Congratulations went to Brian Roat, Roger Vines, Leo Hart, Denham Grierson, Dave Shaw, John and Michael Winneke, Dick Reeve and Ian Murray who gained selection in combined Australian Universities team.

THIRTY-FIVE YEARS AGO — 1948

Jack Bray (Ormond coach) made a comeback and led his team to an unexpected victory against Coburg. Others to star were Eric Donaldson, and Joe Sheehan.

University Blues (9.4) defeated Parkside (8.8) to score their seventh win and join Old Xaverians. Commonwealth Bank and Balwyn in the fight for third and fourth positions in 'B' section. Brunswick and Parkside were on top with 9 wins.

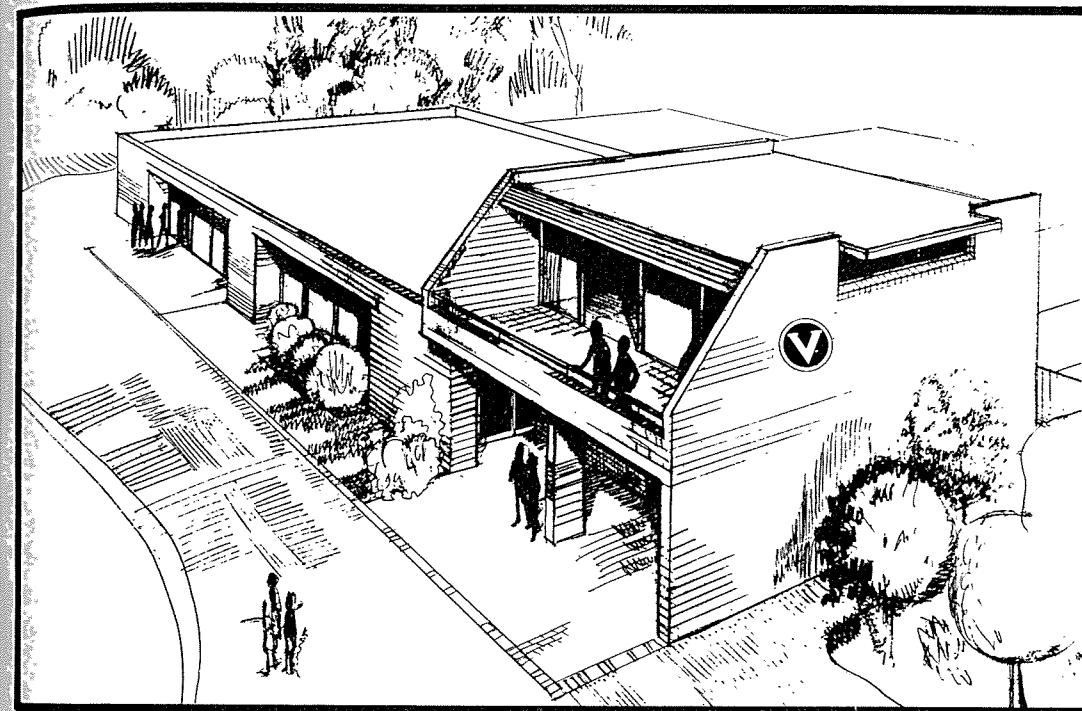
BELATED 50TH GAMES AT OLD PARADIANS
