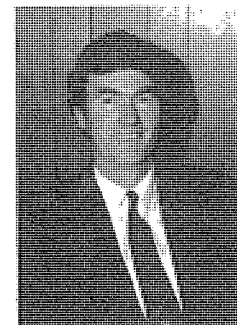

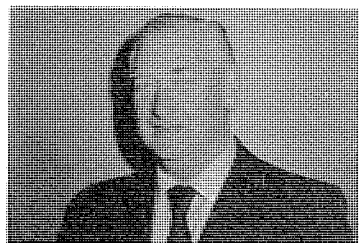

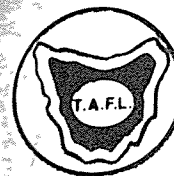
VICTORIA — THE 1985 HOSTS

The first mention of a Carnival occurred at the Council Meeting held in Melbourne on 29th September, 1933 where it was decided to hold a Carnival in Melbourne in 1935 or Adelaide in 1936 arrangements to be left to the V.A.F.A. and S.A.A.F.L.

And so at the meeting held in Melbourne on the 20th August, 1935 it was decided to hold the 1st A.A.F.C. Carnival in Adelaide to coincide with South Australia's centenary celebration and invitations were extended to the W.A.A.F.A. and New South Wales and Queensland Australian National Football Leagues.

In August, 1937 it was resolved to hold the second Carnival in Launceston in August 1938 and invitations were again sent to West Australia, New South Wales and Queensland as well as the Canberra Australian National Football League.

Both of these Carnivals were won by this year's host state — VICTORIA.



Tasmanian Amateur Football League

Amateur football in Tasmania was founded on the 10th June, 1931 at Launceston under the Secretaryship of Eric Coulter. Old Launcestonians, Old Patricians (now St. Patrick's Old Collegians) and Associated Banks were the foundation clubs. The Public Schools Old Boys Association was founded at Hobart in 1931 with Ray Vincent as Hon. Secretary and Hutchins, Old Virgilians, Friends' and Clemes affiliating. 1932 saw the commencement of annual intrastate games, now traditionally known as North versus South matches. In 1947 the P.S.O.B.A. changed its name to the Southern Tasmanian Amateur Football Association and in 1948 affiliated with the Northern body to form the Tasmanian Amateur Football League — the respective bodies being known as the Northern and Southern Divisions.

Eric Coulter and Ray Vincent did a tremendous amount of work for Amateur Football both in Tasmania and nationally and have been awarded Life Memberships of their Divisions, of the T.A.F.L. and the A.A.F.C. They have also received the National Football League and the T.A.N.F.L. Merit Award Certificates, as well as from the Sportsman's Association of Australia. Ray's greatest accolade, so richly deserved, was the award of Member of the British Empire in 1977 'for his outstanding services to the sport of Amateur Football'.

Each Division controls amateur football in their area and elect three delegates to the State Council. The State President and Secretary are from the same Division and hold office for two years after which the offices are assumed from the delegates from the other Division. This system of administration has been outstandingly successful and forms the only truly statewide competition for football in Tasmania.

Presently there are 27 clubs of which 15 play in the Southern Division and 17 in the Northern. The total number of teams is 62. A significant step was taken in 1985 with the absorption of clubs from the League.

Despite being relatively small in numbers, Tasmania has been a regular participant in all Carnivals and since 1960 has been playing regular matches against the V.A.F.A. Success has been limited but enthusiasm has never lacked.

The Victorian Amateur Football Association

The Victorian Amateur Football Association was founded in 1892 making it the second oldest football body in Australia. It owes its existence in so many ways to its "founding father" Mr L.A. Adamson who was President from 1896 to 1915 and 1920 to 1932.

A great strength to the V.A.F.A. has been its many loyal and long serving administrators.

Messrs. H.J. Stewart, E.F. Atkins, J. Fullerton, F.C. Coldrey, G.T. Moore, L.S. Zachariah, M.G. Russel, T.A. Johnson, A.J. Keam and J.S. McCann are but some whose names have become synonymous with the V.A.F.A.

Today we have Messrs. J.F.X. Dillon, J.F. Hawkins and N.C. Rundle carrying on in the footsteps of those who have served the Association so well.

Since 1977 which saw inter-alia the formation of a Marketing and Properties Committee the V.A.F.A. has literally leapt into prominence.

Vital decisions were made which led to —

- the re-building of Elsternwick Park as the Association's permanent playing and administrative headquarters and at which the Association has appointed a caterer to handle all its official functions.
- the appointment of the Association's first full time General Manager, Mr. Peter French.
- erection of an electronic scoreboard.
- a wider programme of representative matches which now involve the V.F.A. and V.C.F.L.
- procuring of major and minor sponsorships.
- establishing closer and stronger ties with the media.

- ✓ **SHANE MURPHY:** (De La Salle) (c). Former Hawthorn player who has represented the VAFA with distinction. Usually a half forward but played full forward against the VFA. Always rises to the occasion.
- ✓ **ROHAN BROWN:** (Old Melburnians) (vc). Experienced ruckman who is very enthusiastic. Played with Carlton. Excelled against the VFA.
- ✓ **CHRIS STONE:** (Caulfield Grammarians). Centreman or ruck rover. Strong player with VFL experience at St. Kilda.
- ✓ **FERGUS KIEL:** (Old Scotch). Captain of his club. Centre half back with great skills. Has had a thigh injury, but likely to be fit and line up on a wing or back flank.
- ✓ **PAT SALINGER:** (University Blues). Very reliable full back who kept VFA full forward Mark Fotheringham to one goal.
- ✓ **NICK WILTON:** (Old Xaverians). Centre half back who is a strong player and good overhead. Experience with Hawthorn. Had a good day against the VFA.
- ✓ **RICK DeMARTE:** (Bulleen-Templestowe). Rover who was with the Swans earlier this year. Quick and strong, but missed the VFA game with a thigh injury. A Section best and fairest.
- ✓ **JOHN KANIS:** (Caulfield Grammarians). Rover with pace and determination. Did well against the VFA. Has had an injury problem.
- ✓ **PETER GITTOS:** (Ivanhoe). Captain of his club. Centre half back who is renowned for his marking strength. Faced tribunal this week.
- ✓ **GUY RITCHIE:** (Ormond). Very determined back pocket who inspired his teammates against the VFA. Nuggety and strong.
- ✓ **MARK McDONALD:** (Ormond). Centre half forward who is very mobile and a good mark. Spent last year at Melbourne. He impressed against the VFA.
- ✓ **PAUL CONSIDINE:** (North O.B.). Big strong ruckman who will probably play in the back pocket. Can play centre half back.
- ✓ **SIMON EISHOLD:** (Ormond). Ruck rover who was best against the VFA. Strong, determined and creative with the ability to kick goals when on the forward flank.
- ✓ **MICK DEVESON:** (De La Salle). Excellent left footed centre half back. Not the most elegant kick but goes at the ball very hard. A good player on the back flank against the VFA.
- ✓ **ANDREW SMYTHE:** (Bulleen-Templestowe). He is a brilliant wing or half back with his club. Lined up in the centre against the VFA and ran himself into the ground. A key player who did pre-season at Collingwood.
- ✓ **GREG CAMERON:** (Ivanhoe). Half back flanker who is quite a good mark. Played against the VFA.
- ✓ **CHARLIE CAPIRON:** (St. Kilda). Versatile, slick ruck rover/half forward who played against the VFA. Experience in VFL at St. Kilda and Swans.
- ✓ **ALAN NAYLOR:** (Ormond). Almost a veteran, this great tap ruckman unluckily missed against the VFA. Great user of his body.
- ✓ **RICK VAN DEN DRIEST:** (Bulleen-Templestowe). Dashing blonde back flanker who provided a lift against the VFA. Highly skilled left footer.
- ✓ **JAMES GARDE:** (University Blacks). Ruckman who got a guernsey in the forward pocket against the VFA and kicked 3 goals.
- ✓ **PETER SHERWEN:** (Old Scotch). Very talented player who is over a hamstring problem. Can play almost anywhere; centre, wing, half forward or ruck rover. Great mark and long kick.
- ✓ **PHIL CALLIL:** (Caulfield Grammarians). Versatile backman who has pace. Former Old Xaverians player.
- ✓ **BRIAN HODGE:** (Old Scotch). Wingman or ruck rover who is very talented. Has pace and uses the ball very well. Experience with Richmond and Footscray.
- ✓ **ANDY MEHRTEN:** (Ormond). Rover, who is very strong. Consistent type who can kick goals.
- ✓ **MIKE McDONALD:** (Ivanhoe). Strong left footer who can play in the centre, on the wing or forward flank. Missed VFA game due to a virus.
- ✓ **NICK BOURKE:** (Old Xaverians). Played on the wing against the VFA but more suited up forward. Has all the skills and will be thrilled to be included.

FOOTBALLS

Match balls will be: Sherrin, Faulkner and Burleigh and when a clash occurs each make shall be used for half the match.

NUMBER OF PLAYERS IN TEAMS

A.A.F.C. rules provide that the number of players in the party for Carnival matches shall be limited to 25 per state. The names of the 25 players are to be notified to the Secretary by the day prior to the first match of the carnival. Three interchange players will be permitted.

UMPIRES

Tasmania and South Australia have opted to send two umpires each who along with the Victorian panel selected will come under the control of the host state's Umpire's Advisor, Mr. Neville Nash.

LINES ON GROUND

There will be a centre square but no line through the centre.

TRIBUNAL

Any reports will be heard by a Tribunal appointed by the host state. The Tribunal shall have power to impose such penalties as it thinks fit.

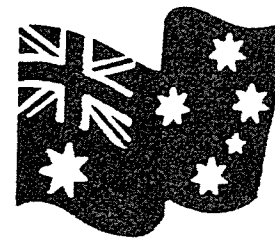

Western Australian Amateur Football League

The Western Australian Amateur Football League was formed in 1922 when known as the Perth Mercantile Association.

Starting as a five team competition, the W.A.A.F.L. has developed amateur football to become one of the largest sporting bodies in Western Australia.

Today fifty six member clubs are represented by 155 teams competing in twelve grades of senior football and four grades for colts. Much of the progress made by amateur football in this state is due to the efforts of the late H.B. Grosvenor M.B.E. He served the W.A.A.F.L. as Secretary Treasurer from 1936 to 1980, a 43 year period that has stamped his influence on the development of the game.

Now the League is led by President T.R. Howard and administered by a Committee of Management with a full-time Executive Officer.

At the Council meeting held in Perth in August 1948 West Australia's delegate Mr. Grosvenor reported that the Western Australian Trotting Association had offered through the W.A.A.F.A. to present a shield valued at 25 pounds for perpetual competition at A.A.F.C. Carnivals and a replica of the shield would be given to the winning state at each carnival, the shield to be known as the Western Australian Trotting Association Shield.

It was decided to accept the offer and to make the record complete it was resolved that Victoria's victories in the 1936 and 1938 carnivals be recorded on the shield.

A Section Review

I only tipped two winners last week, testimony to the evenness and unpredictability of the season as much as my inability to read the form. Ormond is sitting comfortably on top, followed now by North, then come five sides on 24 points: Collegians, Scotch, Ivanhoe, Bulleen-Templestowe and De La Salle. In the battle to avoid relegation, St. Bernard's at present are a game clear of Old Xavs and Blues.

North Old Boys moved into second place with a 41 point win over Old Scotch who slipped to fourth spot. North looked good from the start but Nelson and Smith for Scotch held them out. North's running began to take over in the second quarter and their defence held strong; its hard tackling led by Considine kept Scotch to just 6 goals for the day. Jerome Griffin kicked 4 goals for North but their best was robust centreman Steve O'Rourke.

De La Salle had a good 30 point win over Ivanhoe. It was all Ivanhoe until 10 minutes before half time when De La Salle added 4 quick goals to go to a 2 point lead at the break, all caused by some undisciplined play by the Ivanhoe defenders, in particular reacting badly to some umpiring decisions. De La Salle did not look back after that and handled the conditions better in the second half to become easy winners. Shane Murphy stood out on the forward flank and kicked 3 goals.

Collegians had their first win for some time when they beat University Blues by 59 points at Harry Trott. Collegians began to get on top in the second quarter, but in the third term they added 8 goals, with half forward Tony Baum getting four for the quarter. Tim Bennett played in the ruck and rested in defence and was a good player. Blues lacked players up forward apart from Tyquin who kicked six. Ashton and Salinger were good defenders.

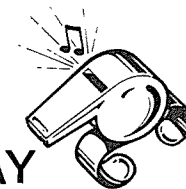

200 games to **Byron Hill**, State Savings Bank's classy rover.

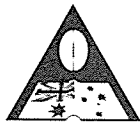
